Bachelor of Computer Science/Bachelor of Laws (BCompSc/LLB)

This double degree program consists of units from the Bachelor of Computer Science combined with units from the Bachelor of Laws. Students graduate with two degrees - the Bachelor of Computer Science and the Bachelor of Laws. Most students will commence in the Bachelor of Computer Science before starting concurrent study in the Bachelor of Laws program.

Entry Requirements

A higher HSC score is required for admission to this program, but transfer in later years from the Bachelor of Computer Science is possible for students who have a better than average academic record.

The Bachelor of Laws is accredited by the Supreme Court of NSW for admission as a legal practitioner in NSW and this recognition extends to other Australian States and Territories. After completion of academic qualifications in Law, entry to legal practice also requires the completion of practical training requirements which differ in each State.

The Bachelor of Computer Science has been granted Level A accreditation by the Computer Society of Australia.

Bachelor of Economics/Bachelor of Laws (BEc/LLB)

The Bachelor of Economics/Bachelor of Laws degree broadens career options. The Bachelor of Laws qualifies graduates for admission to legal practice in NSW and other states and territories, after completion of a professional legal training course. However, entry into legal practice is not necessarily the dominant career path for law graduates. Many find employment in areas such as commerce, banking, management, the public service, the diplomatic service, counselling, social work and teaching where their knowledge of law enhances their worth. A Bachelor of Economics degree provides students with an understanding of the functioning of a modern economy and a capacity to analyse the causes and consequences of economic change. The knowledge

and skills acquired in the Economics degree program can give graduates a head start in the search for a rewarding and challenging career.

Bachelor of Environmental Science/Bachelor of Laws (BEnvSc/LLB)

The Bachelor of Laws component comprises a compulsory core of subjects, covering the traditional areas of legal education, for example, Introduction to legal systems and methods, constitutional law, contract law, the law of torts, corporations law, etc. Students then complete up to a number of subjects from three possible groupings, which represent different areas of legal education and provide students with a broad experience of areas of legal study.

In the Bachelor of Environmental Science component, students complete a core of prescribed units to ensure a solid scientific base for further study in environmental science. The prescribed component covers topics in biology, chemistry, mathematics and statistics, plant taxonomy, ecology, the evolution, ecology and land-use impacts of Australian wildlife, vertebrate zoology, resource survey and habitat evaluation and impact assessment in natural resources management. In addition to completing the prescribed study, students are able to pursue studies in area such as aquatic ecology, Australasian terrestrial ecology, GIS and remote sensing, soil science, agriculture and natural resources in relation to the environment, sustainable resource use and environmental management, park and wildland management, the principles of hydrology, water resources management, environmental technology, vegetation management, etc.

The Bachelor of Laws is accredited by the Supreme Court of NSW for admission as a legal practitioner in NSW and Mutual Recognition legislation extends this recognition to other Australian States and Territories. After completion of academic qualifications in Law, entry to legal practice also requires the completion of practical training requirements which differ in each State.

Eligible students may include one LLM unit in their program of study (except LLM 619, 620, 621 or 622).

Eligible candidates may proceed to Honours in Laws in the Bachelor of Laws component. Refer to the Bachelor of Laws entry.

Professional Legal Training

Bachelor of Financial Administration/Bachelor of Laws (BFinAdmin/LLB)

The Bachelor of Financial Administration/Bachelor of Laws broadens career options. A Bachelor of Laws qualifies graduates for admission to legal practice in NSW and other states and territories, after completion of a professional legal training course. However, entry into legal practice is not necessarily the dominant career path for law graduates. Many find employment in areas

such as commerce, banking, management, the public service, the diplomatic service, counselling, social work and teaching where their knowledge of law enhances their worth. The Bachelor of Financial Administration is designed for students who wish to pursue a career in accounting, either as accountants in private practice or in industry. Students wishing to satisfy the educational requirements for admission to the major professional accounting bodies may do so by including relevant elective units in the degree. On completion of the double degrees program, additional practical experience and training will be necessary to satisfy the requirements for admission to CPA Australia and the Institute of Chartered Accountants in Australia.

Course Requirements

To qualify for the degree a student must pass units equivalent to 240 cp.

Bachelor of Financial Administration Component

The Bachelor of Financial Administration component must include units to the value of 96 cp comprising:

- (a) **compulsory units** equivalent to the value of 66 cp:

- (b) **other units**, excluding Law units, to the value of sufficient cp to provide the total of at least 96 cp from Schools of the Faculty of Economics, Business and Law and/or units approved by the Course Coordinator, from Schools outside the Faculty, provided that the program includes units to the value of at least 24 cp at 300 level of which at least 18 cp shall be from those with an AFM prefix.

Bachelor of Laws Component

Eligible students may include one LLM unit in their program of study (except LLM 619, 620, 621 or 622).

Eligible candidates may proceed to Honours in Laws in the Bachelor of Laws component. Refer to the Bachelor of Laws entry.

Professional Legal Training

Bachelor of Science/Bachelor of Laws (BSc/LLB)

This double degree program consists of units from the Bachelor of Science combined with units from the Bachelor of Laws and students graduate with two degrees—the Bachelor of Science and the Bachelor of Laws. Most students will commence in the Bachelor of Science before starting concurrent study in the Bachelor of Laws program.

The Bachelor of Laws is accredited by the Supreme Court of NSW for admission as a legal practitioner in NSW and this recognition extends to other Australian States and Territories. After completion of academic qualifications in Law, entry to legal practice also requires the completion of practical training requirements which differ in each State.

Course Requirements

To satisfy requirements for the double degree program, candidates must complete 240 cp as prescribed below.

Entry Requirements

With the permission of the Course Coordinator, a candidate who has completed all but one of the units required to qualify for the degree may enrol in that unit concurrently with the Honours course.

As part of the Bachelor of Agribusiness or the Bachelor of Business or their equivalent, a candidate must have:

- (a) completed units to the value of at least 24 cp at 300 level; and
- (b) passed units to the value of at least 36 cp at 200 level or above at Credit level or better.

A person who has fulfilled the requirements for a degree at another university, recognised by the Faculty for this purpose and who has conformed with the equivalent of the requirements above, may be admitted to candidature.

Requirements for Honours

Candidates must complete either:

- (a) a combination of dissertation and advanced coursework units at 400 level to the value of 48 cp prescribed by the Head(s) of the appropriate School(s); or
- (b) a single 400 level Honours unit to the value of 48 cp where the combination and weighting of the dissertation and coursework components is prescribed by the Head of School.

Full-time students will complete the requirements for honours in one year. Part-time students will complete the course in not more than two years and must meet residential requirements as laid down by the Course Coordinator. The Course Coordinator and Head of School may specify conditions under which a full-time student may transfer to part-time study.

Bachelor of Agricultural and Resource Economics with Honours (BAGResEc(Hons))

A candidate who has fulfilled requirements for the Bachelor of Agricultural and Resource Economics at The University of New England at a high standard of performance, and successfully completed the unit ECON 496 Research Seminar is eligible for Honours at graduation.

Bachelor of Business with Honours (BBus(Hons))

The Honours program involves an additional fourth year of full time study, composed of advanced coursework and research tailored to a candidate's area of interest.

Entry Requirements

A candidate will have fulfilled requirements for the Bachelor of Business at The University of New England, or have completed all but one of the units required to qualify for the degree. With the permission of the Course Coordinator a candidate may enrol in that unit concurrently with the Honours course; and

- (a) completed units to the value of at least 24 cp at 300 level; and
- (b) passed units to the value of at least 36 cp at 200 level or above at Credit level or better.

A person who has fulfilled the requirements for a degree at another university, recognised by the Faculty for this purpose and who has conformed with the equivalent of the requirements above, may be admitted to candidature.

Requirements for Honours

Candidates must complete either:

- (a) NEBS 406, 499, 407; or
- (b) a single 400 level Honours unit to the value of 48 cp where the combination and weighting of the dissertation and coursework components is prescribed by the Head of School.

Students enrolling in NEBS 400 must have completed NEBS 305.

Full-time students will complete the requirements for honours in one year. Part-time students will complete the course in not more than two years and must meet residential requirements as laid down by the Course Coordinator. The Course Coordinator and Head of School may specify conditions under which a full-time student may transfer to part-time study.

Bachelor of Economics with Honours (BEc(Hons))

The Bachelor of Economics with Honours offers advanced training for students seeking careers as professional economists. It also provides a research training pathway into a Masters or PhD degree. Honours graduates in Economics from UNE hold a wide range of senior positions in both public and private sector organisations, and educational institutions, both nationally and internationally.

Entry Requirements

A candidate must have satisfied the requirements for the Bachelor of Economics at The University of New England, or an equivalent degree from another university. With the permission of the Course Coordinator, a candidate who has completed all but one of the units required to qualify for the degree may be permitted to enrol in that unit concurrently with his or her Honours course.

As part of the Bachelor of Economics degree or its equivalent, a candidate must have:

- (a) successfully completed units with an ECON and/or QM prefix to the value of at least 24 cp at 300 level;
- (b) passed units with an ECON and/or QM prefix to the value of at least 36 cp at 200 level or above at Credit level or better.

Requirements for Honours

A candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Economics with Honours must complete either:

- (a) a combination of dissertation and advanced coursework units to the value of 48 cp in units at 400 level, as prescribed by the Head(s) of the appropriate School(s); or
- (b) a single 400 level Honours unit to the value of 48 cp where the combination and weighting of the dissertation and coursework components is prescribed by the Head(s) of the appropriate School(s).

Full-time students will complete the requirements for honours in one year. Part-time students will complete the course in not more than two years and must meet residential requirements as laid down by the Course Coordinator. The Course Coordinator and Head of School may specify conditions under which a full-time student may transfer to part-time study.

Bachelor of Financial Administration with Honours (BFinAdmin(Hons))

The Honours program involves an additional fourth year of full time study and it is recognised in the market place as an award of academic achievement.

Entry Requirements

A candidate will have fulfilled requirements for the Bachelor of Financial Administration at The University of

New England, or have completed all but one of the units required to qualify for the degree. With the permission of the Course Coordinator a candidate may enrol in that unit concurrently with the Honours course; *and*

- (a) completed units to the value of at least 24 cp at 300 level; *and*
- (b) passed units to the value of at least 36 cp at 200 level or above at Credit level or better.

A person who has fulfilled the requirements for a degree at another university, recognised by the Faculty for this purpose and who has conformed with the equivalent of the requirements above, may be admitted to candidature.

Requirements for Honours

Candidates must complete either:

- (a) NEBS 406, 407, 499; or
- (b) a single 400 level Honours unit to the value of 48 cp where the combination and weighting of the dissertation and coursework components is prescribed by the Head of School.

Students enrolling in NEBS 400 must have completed NEBS 305.

Full-time students will complete the requirements for honours in one year. Part-time students will complete the course in not more than two years and must meet residential requirements as laid down by the Course Coordinator. The Course Coordinator and Head of School may specify conditions under which a full-time student may transfer to part-time study.

Bachelor of Laws with Honours (LLB(Hons))

Students who, on entering their final year have obtained a grade point average of 5.5 or better in the preceding eight units (where High Distinction = 7; Distinction = 6; Credit = 5; Pass = 4) with no failures are eligible to enrol in LS 400, Honours in Law, and be admitted to the Honours program. The Course Coordinator has discretion to allow a student to enrol in LS 400 and be admitted to the Honours program who does not meet the preceding criteria.

Students who completed any of their preceding eight LS units prior to the start of Semester 1, 2006 may, with the permission of the Course Coordinator, enrol in LS 400 with a grade point average between 5.0 and 5.499.

Requirements for Honours

LS 400 Honours in Law is listed in the elective offerings and is completed in the final year of the Bachelor of Laws program.

Students enrol in and complete the unit LS 400, Honours in Law and, if the thesis component and final grade for that unit are Pass or better, must lodge with the Unit Coordinator both a hard-bound and electronic copy of their Honours thesis for retention in the Law Library.

The award of Honours shall be at the discretion of the faculty on the recommendation of the School of Law. However the following matters shall be considered in determining the level of award:

- (a) the student's level of performance in LS 400;
- (b) the student's performance in their best 15 LS units taken for the Bachelor of Laws component of a double degree program;
- (c) the student's rate of progress through the degree program.
