### Bachelor of Languages Guidelines

To qualify for the degree a candidate shall pursue a program of study for a minimum period of four years, and shall pass units to the value of at least 192 credit points.

Except with the permission of the Faculty, a candidate shall include:

- at least 6 credit points in Linguistics @ 100 level.
- at least 12 credit points in each of three subjects including at least 12 credit points in each of two languages other than English;
- not more than 60 credit points at 100 level;
- at least 60 credit points in one language, of which at least 12 are at 300 level, excluding the in-country language units, or at least 48 credit points in each of two languages of which at least 12 are at 300 level;
- units to the value of at least 36 credit points at 300 level or above, excluding the in-country language units;
- not more than 96 credit points in any one language, excluding in-country language units, of which not more than 24 shall be at 100 level;
- at least 48 credit points from in-country residence units.
