



The Caswell and Mulligan Ancient History International Travel Bursary

The Caswell and Mulligan Ancient History International Travel Bursary is valued at \$2500 and is awarded annually to a currently enrolled BA Ancient History student at 300 or 400 level. The recipient will normally have achieved three (3) Distinction results in 100 level units or above in Ancient History or related subjects, or be recommended by the Convenor of Ancient History as eligible to apply for this award.

The bursary is to enable the recipient to participate in an overseas archaeological dig, or to undertake museum work at an overseas international museum.

Applicants will complete an application form available on the School of Humanities website, <http://www.une.edu.au/humanities/pdf/anch-international-travel-bursary-application-form.pdf> which will include a detailed itinerary, budget, 250-500 word proposal concerning the nature of the proposed overseas trip, its purpose, and its proposed outcomes. An academic transcript must accompany the application.

After completion of the travel the recipient will submit a 2000 word report to be published on the School of Humanities website and deliver a public lecture at UNE concerning their trip.

Applications will close by the last Friday in April of each year.

Eligibility requirements

1. The recipient will be a currently enrolled 300 or 400 level student in Ancient History;
2. The recipient must be an Australian citizen or have permanent residency;
3. The recipient will normally have achieved at least three (3) Distinctions in 100 level units or above in Ancient History or related subjects unless the awarding committee waives this requirement on the advice of the Convenor of Ancient History;
4. The recipient may be a full or part time, external or internal student enrolled in a UNE degree; applications will be judged on their merit;
5. The recipient will apply using the application form available from the Convenor of Ancient History, setting out a detailed itinerary, budget, 250-500 word proposal concerning the nature of their trip, its purpose, and its outcomes;
6. The recipient will write a 2000 word report and deliver a public lecture concerning the travel project once completed; and
7. The recipient may choose to enrol in a HUMS 300 level reading unit as part of this travel bursary in consultation with the Convenor of Ancient History and gain partial assessment credit for this unit through the bursary project.



Selection of recipient

The Convenor of Ancient History in consultation and meeting with Ancient History colleagues and the Teaching and Learning Committee, School of Humanities.

Presentation of Award

Informal ceremony in the School of Humanities, UNE.

Recipient responsibility to donor

The recipient will participate in an overseas archaeological dig or undergo an internship in an overseas museum. Other projects with merit will also be considered; however, it is strongly recommended that applicants discuss their project with the convenor of Ancient History to ensure its viability.

The recipient will present a two thousand (2000) word report on the outcomes of the bursary to the donor, to be published on School of Humanities website, and a one (1) hour public lecture presented to the School of Humanities.
