Digi-scapes: Considering the digital landscapes of children and young people

In what ways do children and young people differentiate between physical and digital landscapes? How does the digital world challenge children and young people's understandings of place and space? What are the benefits and challenges for children and young people as digital environments are increasingly a part of their everyday lives?
