Borrowing from Other Libraries

Live near another university? Check out how you can [borrow from other universities](#).

University Libraries of Australia and New Zealand (ULANZ) is the borrowing scheme for students and staff at Australian and New Zealand universities. UNE staff and students can apply for in-person borrowing rights at the libraries of [ULANZ](#) universities.

Once you join you will be able to borrow physical items from the library but you probably won't be able to access their online resources.

Borrowing conditions are set by the host library. You must observe these conditions and pay any appropriate fees and charges. The University Library has an obligation to recover outstanding fees and charges on behalf of host libraries



Requesting Loans from UNE Library

If you are studying Online and live outside of the Armidale and Uralla postcodes you are eligible for postal delivery of materials from our collection. Requests for items can be made directly from [Search](#).

The duration of loans and the number of items you are allowed to borrow depend on your enrolment and [Loan terms](#) can be limited to a two week loan or the original loan time shortened if a book is needed by another client. This is particularly important to note with mandatory textbooks as they will be in high demand.

The return postage cost of the items will be incurred by the borrower. You will need to ensure the book arrives by the due date and we recommend asking for a tracking label so you can be sure the item reaches us.

Your Online Library Account

To renew your loans log into your [Online Library Account](#) from the [Renew your loans](#) icon on the library home page.

You can also check to make sure we have received your returns and see the items we have recalled for you.

A renewal is an extension of your original loan period. A loan cannot be renewed if:

- You have already renewed the item the maximum number of times.
- Another borrower is waiting for the item.
- You are suspended from borrowing.

Exhibitions in the Dixson Library

New Year. New Exhibitions.

Three new exhibitions have been installed on Level 2 of the Dixson Library.

The Letters Corridor features two exhibitions curated by Bachelor of Historical Inquiry and Practice students as part of their WORK300 unit undertaken with Ian Stephenson. Both students used the Museum of Education and Heritage Centre collections for original source material.

Never on Sunday: Sabbatarian Literature of the Long Nineteenth Century considers two Sabbatarian authors and their didactic nature of writing. Mrs. Sherwood and Mrs. Barbauld convey strong messages that promote the characteristics of Evangelicalism, such as the requirement to acknowledge one's moral depravity and seek redemption through the worship of God. The framed works illustrate the moral lessons that were being promoted through Sabbatarian literature. A focus display examines the literature at the local level through the Mackenzie and Everett families of Ollera. Curated by Rachel Hinton.



Vere Chamberlain: Vignettes of an Armidale Life explores the life of Vere Chamberlain through the archival collection of the Heritage Centre and her book collection donated by a family friend to the Museum of Education. The Chamberlains arrived in Australia in 1888. Soon after reaching Sydney, they moved to the Guyra region to try and obtain work, settling at Armidale in 1889. In 1912 the family bought a block of land at 63 Barney Street naming the house they built "Richmond" after the town in England where they had been married.

Vere Chamberlain (1897–1989) attended the Superior Public Infants School and the Girls Superior Public School. She earned several prizes donated by local businesses for her academic achievements in school. From 1916 to 1931 Vere worked at Mallam & Co a local Chemist and Bookseller as a Bookkeeper. Curated by Carol Corless.

The third exhibition is outside the Training Lab. ***Come up and see our etchings: Part 2: Demolition*** continues the four part series of works on paper gifted and bequeathed in the first half of the 20th century to the New England University College and the Armidale Teachers' College. Like photographers and writers, artists of the built environment become recorders of the past. The five etchings in Part 2 by Cedric Emanuel, Sydney Ure Smith and Lionel Lindsay depict places which have disappeared. Curated by Danielle Rossi Duarte.
