Dr Pema Gyamtsho, Director General, International Centre for Integrated Mountain Development, Nepal

Title: The Hindu Kush Himalaya – A Region under Threat from the Triple Planetary Crises and in Need of Urgent Research Attention.



Pema Gyamtsho is the Director General of ICIMOD, the International Centre for Integrated Mountain Development based in Kathmandu, Nepal. Prior to joining ICIMOD in 2020, he served the Royal Government of Bhutan for over three decades working at the science-policy-practice interface in natural resources management and planning; rural development; agriculture; forestry; livestock and food production; rangeland management; livestock

development; participatory approaches; research and extension institutional building; climate change and environmental protection; biodiversity conservation; and organic farming.

Dr. Gyamtsho was the Minister of Agriculture and Forests with additional responsibility as Minister-in-Charge of National Environment Commission in Bhutan's first democratically elected government from 2008-2013. Subsequently, he served as Leader of Opposition in Bhutan's parliament from 2013 to 2020. In the above positions, Dr. Gyamtsho played an instrumental role in leading the formulation and enactment of many laws related to the naturals resources and environmental sectors as well as overseeing the country's successful rural development programme.

Dr. Gyamtsho holds a PhD in Natural Science from the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology in Zurich, Switzerland and a M.Agr.Sc.(Hon) from Lincoln University in Christchurch, New Zealand.
