MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

BETWEEN O'CONNOR CATHOLIC COLLEGE, AUSTRALIA AND GYESEONG GIRLS' HIGH SCHOOL, KOREA

This Memorandum of Understanding (hereinafter the "MOU") is made on <u>August 3rd, 2011</u> by and between O'Connor Catholic College (hereinafter the "O'Connor") and Gyeseong Girls' High School (hereinafter the "Gyeseong") in accordance with the following details and terms. Recognizing the benefit of building a sister school relationship and exchanging students and teachers, O'Connor and Gyeseong agree to develop an annual exchange program in the near future on the basis of equality and mutual benefits in which students and teachers can experience different cultures by visiting each other's school and homestaying at students' and teachers' houses.

1. Introduction

1.1. O'Connor is a systematic, Catholic college located in Armidale in New South Wales, Australia.

1.2. Gyeseong is a private, Catholic high school located in downtown Seoul, Korea.

1.3. This MOU demonstrates an intention by O'Connor and Gyeseong to cooperate to promote an annual exchange program of students and teachers.

2. Purpose

The purpose of this MOU is to build a sister school relationship and develop an exchange program where students and teachers are given a chance to visit each other's school at a negotiated period of time.


3. Scope of Cooperation

3.1. Annual exchange program of students and teachers: the parties will offer the opportunity to annually exchange students of maximum of 20 and teachers at a proper period and give them an opportunity to join classes of the other party, normally during alternate years.

3.2. Homestay program: both parties will provide homestays in which students and teachers will experience and understand culture of the other party. All Child Protection procedures and guidelines will be met by both schools.

3.3. Exchanging educational information: the parties can ask for information related to educational activities of the other party.

3.4. Both parties will agree to implement the exchange program only if it does not disturb the current educational activities of the other party after prior discussion and negotiation.

hereby agree to become sister schools in order to build up friendship and cooperation between our schools and promote mutual understanding between South Korea and Australia.

- 2. Broaden educational horizons by continuous exchange of curriculum and culture.
- Both schools will participate in the student, teacher, administrator exchange program to provide the opportunity to study, work, and live in the sister school community.



How the UK scored against other OECD countries




Figure 1. Top 10 countries in the World education rankings. Source: OECD PISA 2009 database (<u>http://www.guardian.co.uk/news/datablog/2010/dec/07/world-education-</u> rankings-maths-science-reading).

PISA = Programme for International Student Assessment. TIMSS = Trends in International Mathematics and Science Study


